All villagers will have missed the friendly chimes of the church clock over the last year. Unlike most churches, the clock mechanism is at ground level, just inside the church door, and the hands are



driven by a complex chain of rods and gears. It is this drive mechanism that has failed. Happily the church has been awarded a generous grant from the Banks Moor Farm Fund and

this will enable us to repair the mechanism as well as refurbish the clock face with lovely new blue paint and gold leaf. The work will happen this summer. St Andrew's has received a number of generous grants from Banks - these have enabled us to repair the churchyard wall as well as redecorating the interior of the church and provide the toilet and kitchen area. The PCC is hugely grateful to Banks for their support over the years.

In 1923 a hundred metre long temporary advert was erected to advertise a new housing development in the hills above the Hollywood district of Los Angeles. The sign HOLLYWOOD LAND was only meant to be in place for eighteen months. In 1949 (the year the name was shortened to Hollywood) it was still there! And it still is!

Information signs, particularly useful to tourists are the signposts in both town and city centres pointing the way to places of interest.



In recent years I have noticed how many signs seem to have become more polite; *Thank you for, Thank you for not, Please* - you fill in the gaps.

Whether we are smiling at witty signs, obeying speed limits or following directions, signs are important and helpful and not just a means of communication. Many signs demand action.

In the Old Testament we read how Jonah was sent by God to Nineveh, one of the largest cities in the then known world. Jonah came back wearing sack cloth and ashes proclaiming imminent doom and gloom. Despite his strange apparel people responded positively to his message. God saw their efforts to renounce their evil ways - He changed his mind about the promised disaster, and it never happened.



The crosses seen associated with Christian places of worship act as permanent reminders of the our belief in Jesus' death and resurrection.

Lent itself is a sign, and not just that Easter is on the way.

Last Wednesday, February 22nd, was Ash Wednesday when Christians worldwide marked the beginning of Lent. Traditionally this is a time of giving something up or fasting, but for many it has become a time of taking something on to benefit others and the world.

Lent is a sign to Christians of what Easter is all about: Jesus dying and rising from the dead to give new life to people of faith, as well as hope for the world.

However you keep up to date with the news - tv, radio, newspaper, internet, smartphone - look for signs of hope (however hard to find), take encouragement from them, and display your hope to the world.


