Getting ready, looking forward

American artist and film maker Andy Warhol said, the idea of waiting makes it all the more exciting, and we often say, I'm looking forward to it......

We will all have experienced waiting for exciting events to happen in our lives - a family celebration, waiting to be reunited with loved ones, catching up with friends, being present at an important event, going on holiday - the list could go on and on. And the closer it gets to the day, the more the excitement mounts!

Shops are already preparing for the festive season with tempting Christmas items on the shelves raising excitement levels in children, and even the odd adult. Advent calendars of all kinds are also very much in evidence.

The new church year begins on the first Sunday of Advent - December 3rd this year - when we will not only look back with thanks over the past year, but look forward to what the year ahead may hold in the life of our church. Advent is a time of getting ready and looking forward to Christmas and Christ's birth, and this is reflected in the themes and music of our services during this time.



LAS POSADAS Many countries have different traditions as they prepare for and look forward to the Christmas season.

One Spanish custom, originally from Mexico, and known as $La\ Posada$ - Spanish for inn - takes the form of a nine-day festival beginning on December 16th.

Small figures of Mary and Joseph travel around different households, usually staying for one night. These travels are symbolic of their journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem, just before the first Christmas. Families sign up in advance to act as hosts and then pass the figures on to the next participating household.

Many Anglican churches have successfully adapted this custom, often referred to as the *travelling crib*, to suit their parishes, and before the Covid pandemic we observed *Posada* in Sadberge from December 1st with the figures returning to church at the Christingle service on Christmas Eve.

We plan to do the same this year and would like to open this up to the wider village community - anyone can be involved - families, grandchildren, couples or individuals. On the right is a photo of the Sadberge Posada figures of Mary and Joseph (and their donkey taking a well earned rest). They are beautifully carved in olive wood from the Holy Land.

The church clock

Residents at the west end of the village will already be only too aware that the church clock has finally come back to life following a major refurbishment of the drive mechanism and cables, helpfully striking the hours and the quarters at all hours of the day and night. The Parochial Church Council (PCC) is very grateful to the County Durham Community Foundation (CDCF) for the financial support that has made this possible. The PCC is also very grateful to Sadberge Parish Council for providing a financial guarantee to cover the cost of installing Night Silencing equipment to control the striking of the clock. Once that is installed in the next few weeks the clock will be silent from 10pm until 7am the following morning. At the same time the repainted and regilded clock face will be installed.

The clock is over 100 years old, and the extensive work that has been done in recent weeks has revealed other problems that need to be addressed. The beautiful but ancient mechanism (visible inside the church - see the photo on the right) is in need of stripping and cleaning if it is to last another 100 years, and the wooden beam that supports the mechanism that strikes the bells is beginning to rot, and it too needs replacement.

It is unlikely that the PCC will receive further grants for this work, so we hope that an appeal to members of the congregation and villagers for financial support will enable us to complete the work on the clock in the near future and make it fit for purpose for the next half century.
